Internationalisation of legal education - an unfinished agenda: The case of SLS Pune

Abstract

The beginning of 21st century has witnessed intensified discourses on internationalisation of legal education. Law has a predominant territorial streak which poses a formidable hurdle in the path of the internationalisation of legal education. Currently, legal education faces a challenge in terms of creating lawyers with technical competence encompassing national, international and comparative legal fields. There is an urgent need that law students must imbibe the requisite cultural competence and technical knowledge to operate globally. This makes the objective of internationalising legal education all the more relevant and contemporary.

The article/paper will address the process of internationalisation of legal education by projecting Symbiosis Law School, Pune as a case study. It will explore the various pedagogical as well as the cultural tools adopted to achieve the objective. Its impact and the learning will be analysed. The paper will also highlight the unfinished agenda and challenges faced from national regulations.

Dawn of a comprehensive data protection regime in India: GDPR shows the way

Abstract

The concern regarding privacy started with the increase in the use of advanced technology related to computers and internet. The data and information created, sent, shared, and stored in these digital files through the advanced technologies and platforms are prone to cyber attacks leading to breach of privacy and making public sensitive personal information and data. These concerns have led many countries to adopt data protection laws, to protect the right of privacy on one hand, and to regulate the businesses that gather, store and sell such data for commercial gains, on the other hand. The authors in the research paper have discussed privacy as a construct, then its transformation, its connotations and operation in the Information and communication Technologies World. Further they have discussed, compared and analysed how the issues pertaining to consent, right to be forgotten and handling of sensitive personal data have been addressed in the European Union's General Data Privacy Regulation with the Personal Data Protection Bill, 2019 of India. The authors

conclude on the ever-changing concept of privacy also on how the relevant issues have been addressed either through the prescriptive or the outcome-based provisions of both the GDPR and the PDPB, 2019.

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GDPR: Legal impact on extra-territorial commercial pressure on Indian business, trade and investment

Abstract

European Parliament enacted the Law on GDPR in April 2016 and in May 2016 the official texts and regulations on the directive relating to GDPR were published in all the official languages of the EU. The implementation of GDPR has had an impact on sectors such as data entry, advertising, customer care, banking and IT.

As an increasing number of consumers become aware of GDPR and with instances of heavy fines being imposed on violation of the provisions of GDPR, there is a market pressure created on Indian companies to adopt the EU standards. The law on GDPR requires a company that processes personal information about EU citizens to comply with the regulation even if the company does not have a business undertaking situated within the EU. The extraterritoriality of the law on GDPR puts a pressure on the Indian companies and policy makers to re-examine the existing legal framework in India. It puts a pressure on Indian trade bodies such as FICCI and also upon government agencies to formulate a regulatory regime to achieve a synergy between Indian and EU laws.

The paper will look at the GDPR law in the EU and consider the effect it will have on Indian Businesses, the trade and investment between India and EU and the laws in India. The paper will also study the impact that the law will have in commercial exchanges especially in the context of EU-India bilateral trade negotiation and the possible free trade agreement between the two countries which is being negotiated between India and EU for a considerable period of time now.
